The Care Crisis

Currently, 60% of the 7 million Americans with developmental differences live at home. Approximately a quarter of that population is cared for by a family member who is 60 years of age or older.

Medical advances have enabled this generation of individuals with profound impairments to live longer lives. Most will outlive their parents and will require care from another source. Nationwide, 656,000 people are on waiting lists for government-funded services.


The reality in West Michigan mirrors this national crisis. Few adult foster care homes serving Allegan, Kent, Muskegon, and Ottawa counties can provide the level of care needed. As a result, the few homes that exist are fully occupied, and rooms are rarely available.



HHM Impact Statement

Harbor House Ministries has brought the heart of the housing shortage for adults with complex care needs to the forefront of social, political, and economic discussion. This ministry has informed the West Michigan community and state lawmakers about the needs and the contributions of these individuals.

In addition to providing much needed housing, Harbor House Ministries has been able to create a successful and duplicatable example of combining community fundraising and government dollars to respond to a critical social need.

A Bright Glow

My twin brother, John, lived at Harbor house for about six years. Living there had many impacts on many people.

Perhaps the biggest impact was on John himself. Until he began living at HHM, we had never seen such a bright glow on his face and in his personality. This made the family feel certain that John was receiving care that he had never experienced before.

Also, this glow extended to the many staff workers that cared for John 24/7. He felt the love from the staff, and they felt it back.

It's not an easy job to care for individuals like my brother, especially with staffing shortages the way they are these days. Because staff sometimes worked double shifts or came in on their days off, we knew John's care was never compromised in any way.

Sadly, John passed away this past August. At his repass, we were totally overwhelmed by all the present and past Harbor House staff members that came to pay their respects.

We pray that the wonderful folks at Harbor House will be able to continue their mission of providing the care the residents are so fortunate to receive.


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A Day in the Life

The Call to Care for Our Staff

HHM considers it a privilege and a responsibility to care for our staff. That is why we offer very competitive pay rates, benefits, paid time off and lots of caring appreciation.

The families and friends who visit are inspiring as they care for our staff through words of encouragement, cards, treats, and Christmas gifts.

The staff take care of each other with notes and jokes, and treats as well as covering shifts when another is unable to work.

Professionalizing Direct Care

Harbor House is working with several other organizations to elevate and expand the direct care industry as it seeks to resolve the growing staffing crisis in direct care.

The collaborative effort creates a post-secondary certification program for students to enter the direct care field ready to meet the needs of adults with mental illness and developmental differences. The shared effort between Harbor House, Benjamin's Hope, MOKA, Heritage Homes and Grand Rapids Community College will promote new areas of recruitment into the field.

The Direct Support Professional Certificate program offers a path to grow the number of people mapping a career in Behavioral Health while providing a deeper understanding of the opportunities in this industry.

Everyone Benefits When...

Maya was eight years old when her Dutch parents immigrated to the United States. Their determination to be flexible in building a life in a strange place and to respect work was not lost on Maya. She conveys, "no job is too small to be worth my effort."

Her "job" at HHM is to help monitor the pool at The Cove where she watches over the residents, laughs with them, and encourages them to keep trying as they work out and play in the pool.

While that job requires specific chores and responsibilities, Maya adds to this a unique ability

to predict the needs of others and step into those needs in very relational ways. She can organize a shower room so that everything that is needed is close at hand and the area is safe – avoiding any possible mishap in that anticipation. When she senses that someone is struggling, she pulls them aside for an encouraging word and an ear of understanding. Her objectivity and life experience allow her to see a bigger picture of care.

That picture includes a demonstration of Christ's compassion. Maya says, "Everyone benefits when we are changed by this work." How has she been changed? Perspective. Maya shares that these relationships keep her in a humble and thankful place--aware that even the ability to scratch an itch is not to be taken for granted.

Filling the Gap


While HHM benefitted from a healthy financial picture for 2022, the reality is that we relied on grants and the generosity of our donors to fill a 14% gap between income and expenses.

You can see that Labor and Benefits is our largest expense.


We VALUE our Staff! We would not be able to maintain our high standard of care without them.

Covid-related grants (most of which were related to incentivizing the workforce) helped with that tremendously. However, we do not anticipate the same availability for grants in 2023.
